| Haemoglobin isn't used only in blood, scientists discover | Context A new and serendipitous discovery has revealed that hemoglobin isn't used by RBCs alone. In a study published in Nature, scientists from China have reported that chondrocytes – cells that make cartilage, the connecting tissue between bones – also make hemoglobin and seem to depend on it for their survival. Key points The scientists called these blobs hemoglobin bodies or Hedy. The discovery of functional hemoglobin in cartilage also suggests that it plays a role in certain joint diseases. | |
| 53 accidents, 19 deaths per hour in road crashes in 2022, says Ministry | Context India witnessed 53 accidents and 19 deaths every hour, or an average of 1,264 accidents and 42 deaths, daily in road crashes last year, according to a Ministry of Road Transport and Highways report | |
| | Key findings The number of road accidents in 2022 increased by 11.9% and deaths rose by 9.4%. According to an analysis by the Save Life Foundation, with a crash severity of 38.15, India ranks among the 20 worst countries for road crashes. According to World Road Statistics, 2022 published by the International Road Federation, Geneva, which uses data for the year 2020 in terms of the total number of | |















| | fatalities, India was followed by China (with a crash severity of 25.22) and the U.S. (with a crash severity of 2.01). Of the factors causing road accidents, "speeding" was the most common. It accounted for 72.3% of accidents and 71.2% of deaths. Uttar Pradesh registered the highest share of deaths at 13.4%. This was followed by Tamil Nadu at 10.6% and Maharashtra at 9%. |

| | Key points: The 106th Constitutional Amendment Act stipulates 33% reservation for women in the Lok Sabha and State Assemblies. The 73rd and 74th constitutional amendments of 1993 gave women one-third representation in local body elections. The 77th Constitutional Amendment extended reservations for promotions in jobs for the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. 103rd CAA provided for 10% EWS reservation for poor Forward Caste sections of the society in educational institutions and public employment. |

- **Objective:** placing creativity and cultural industries at the heart of their development plans at the local level and cooperating actively at the international level.
- The Network covers seven creative fields: Crafts and Folk Arts, Media Arts, Film, Design, Gastronomy, Literature, and Music.

| | Key Points: About 90 km from Ernakulam town, Kottathavalam waterfall viewpoint should be on your list for one-day long trips. A trade route existed between Madurai and Erapuzha (present-day Erattupetta), and Kottathavalam acted as a connecting link. The old stairs carved out of rocks that one will encounter during the trail to the top of the hill are believed to have been used by the traders back then. Locals believe that the Pandya King, Manavikrama, escaped from Madurai after losing a battle to the Chola king and used the caves here as hiding spots. Thus, came the name thavalam, which means a 'hideout' in Malayalam. The region is also surrounded by hills on three sides, resembling a 'fort' or a kotta. | | |














Context:
