

## Daily English Vocab 01 May 2024

### 1. Trepidation (noun)

**Meaning;** A fearful state; a state of concern or hesitation.



- **Synonyms:** apprehension, fear
- **Antonyms:** delight, happiness
- **Sentence Example:** He had some *trepidation* about agreeing to their proposal.
- **Noun (Definition):** *Nouns* make up the largest class of words in most languages, including English. A noun is a word that refers to a thing (*book*), a person (*Noah Webster*), an animal (*cat*), a place (*Omaha*), a quality (*softness*), an idea (*justice*), or an action (*yodeling*).

### 2. Misprision (noun)

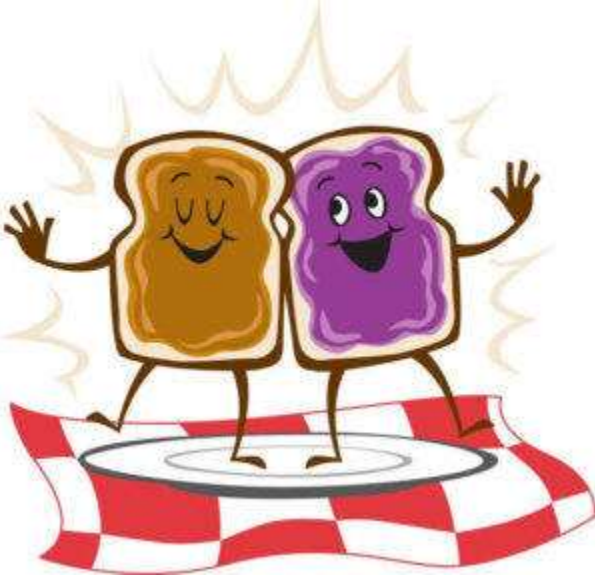
**Meaning;** Criminal neglect of duty or wrongful execution of official duties



- **Synonyms:** contempt
- **Antonyms:** tolerance
- **Sentence Example:** She was later convicted of *misprision* of a felony and sentenced to probation.
- **Noun (Definition):** *Nouns* make up the largest class of words in most languages, including English. A noun is a word that refers to a thing (*book*), a person (*Noah Webster*), an animal (*cat*), a place (*Omaha*), a quality (*softness*), an idea (*justice*), or an action (*yodeling*).

### 3. Concomitant (adjective)

**Meaning;** Accompanying; conjoining; attending; concurrent.



- **Synonyms:** attendant, associate
- **Antonyms:** indifferent, unrelated
- **Sentence Example:** The drug's risks increase with the *concomitant* use of alcohol.
- **Adjective (Definition):** *Adjectives* describe or modify—that is, they limit or restrict the meaning of—nouns and pronouns. They may name qualities of all kinds: *huge, red, angry, tremendous, unique, rare*, etc.

### 4. Telltale (adjective)

**Meaning;** Revealing something, especially something not intended to be known.



- **Synonyms:** indicative, signifying
- **Antonyms:** secretive, uninformative

- **Sentence Example:** The department *telltale* told the boss that his coworkers were taking extra long breaks.
- **Adjective (Definition):** *Adjectives* describe or modify—that is, they limit or restrict the meaning of—nouns and pronouns. They may name qualities of all kinds: *huge, red, angry, tremendous, unique, rare,* etc.
