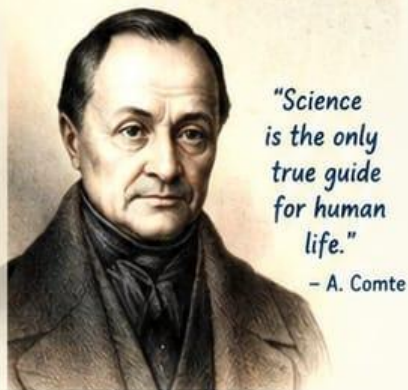

1 POSITIVISM – THE CORE IDEA

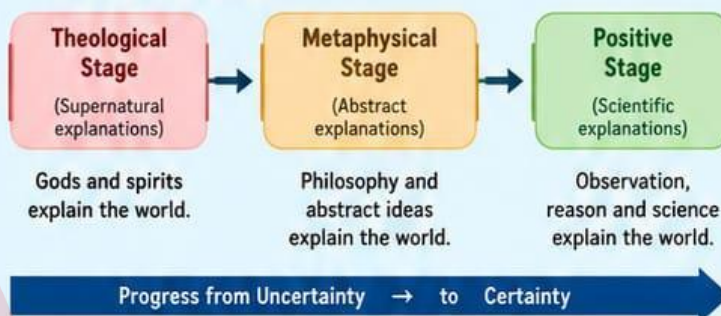
- Only scientific method can give true knowledge.
- Rejects metaphysics, theology and speculation.
- Based on observation, experimentation, and logical reasoning.
- Applies the scientific method to the study of society (Social Physics).



"Sociology is the science of society, just as physics is the science of the physical world."
- Auguste Comte

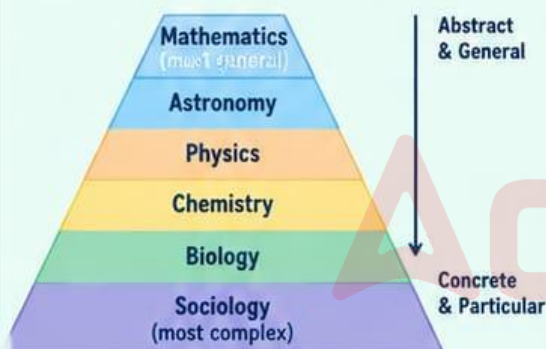
2 LAW OF THREE STAGES

Human thought and social development progress through three stages:



3 HIERARCHY OF SCIENCES

Comte arranged the sciences from simple to complex, from general to specific.



4 SOCIAL STATICS & SOCIAL DYNAMICS

5 THE THEORY OF PROGRESS

- Society evolves towards greater complexity, order and rationality.
- Progress is possible through science, education and moral reform.
- Believed in a final goal – the 'Great Being' (a unified human society based on reason and altruism).



6 RELIGION OF HUMANITY

- Proposed a new religion based on Humanism, which would replace traditional religions.
- Focused on the worship of Great Being (the ideal of humanity).
- Emphasised moral values, social unity and service to society.



Humanity as the object of worship

7 SOCIOLOGY – SOCIAL PHYSICS

- Coined the term 'Sociology' (1838).
- It is the study of the laws of social phenomena.
- Like natural sciences, it should be based on observation, comparison and experimentation.
- Aim – to bring about social order and progress.

- Auguste Comte



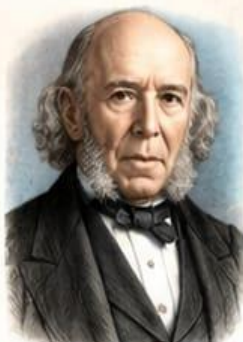

Social Evolution is a Natural and Inevitable Process

1 EVOLUTIONARY THEORY

- Society evolves from simple to complex, from homogeneous to heterogeneous.
- Progress is gradual, continuous and unilinear (one direction).
- Driven by the principle of 'survival of the fittest' (applied to society).

"The survival of the fittest is the law of human progress."
– Herbert Spencer

2 SOCIAL ORGANISM

- Society is like a living organism.
- Parts (institutions) work together for stability and survival.
- Like biological organisms, societies also undergo growth, differentiation and integration.



3 STAGES OF EVOLUTION (SOCIETY)



4 KEY CONCEPTS

- Differentiation** – increase in complexity.
- Integration** – interdependence of parts.
- Progress** – from military to industrial to voluntary.
- Social statics** – study of stability.
- Social dynamics** – study of change (evolution).

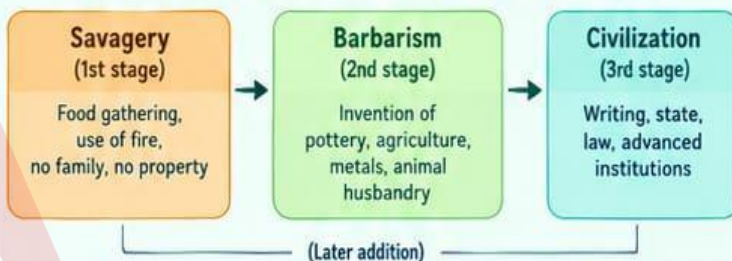


LEWIS HENRY MORGAN

Cultural Evolution Follows a Universal Sequence

1 STAGES OF CULTURAL EVOLUTION

Morgan proposed a 3-fold scheme (Later expanded to 4 stages)



4. Post-Civilization (optional)

Futuristic stage – based on advanced technology and industrial development.

2 BASIS OF EVOLUTION

- Technological progress (tools, fire, agriculture, metallurgy).
- Changes in family and kinship (from matrilineal to patrilineal).
- Development of property, state and law.
- Cultural diffusion and invention.



3 SIGNIFICANCE

- Introduced the method of comparative anthropology.
- Explained the evolution of kinship systems (e.g., matrilineal to patrilineal).
- Showed the role of technology in cultural change.
- Laid foundation for the study of primitive societies.

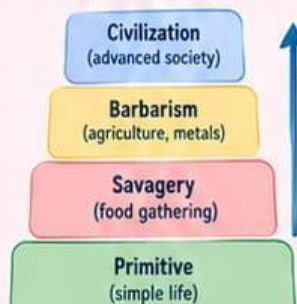

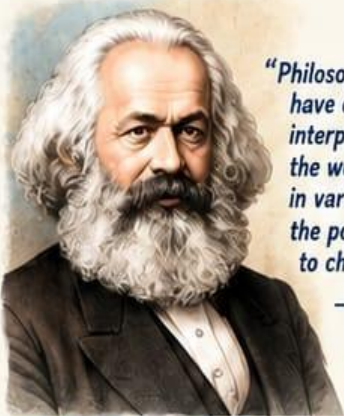

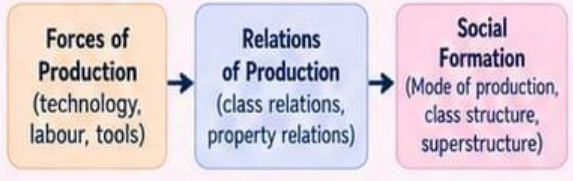

1 HISTORICAL MATERIALISM

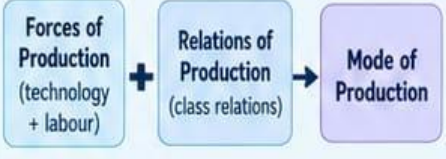
Society develops through the material conditions of life, not ideas.



The economic base determines the social, political, legal and ideological superstructure.

2 MODE OF PRODUCTION

A specific way in which a society produces its material life.

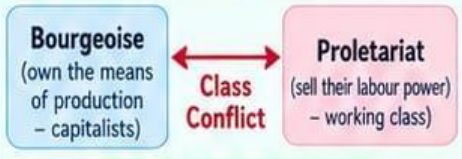


Main modes:

- Primitive • Slave • Feudal • Capitalist • Socialist (communist – future)

3 CLASS STRUGGLE

The history of all hitherto existing societies is the history of class struggles.



Leads to Social Change

From Feudalism → Capitalism → Socialism (Communism)

4 SURPLUS VALUE

Capitalists exploit labour by paying less than the value created by workers.



Source of profit, capital accumulation and exploitation.

5 ALIENATION

Under capitalism, the worker becomes alienated from:

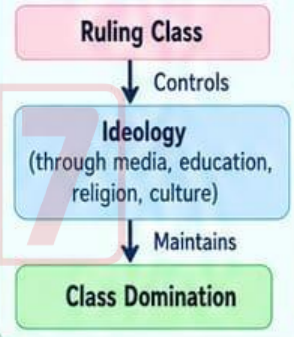
- 1 The product of labour (does not own what he creates)
- 2 The process of labour (labour becomes a compulsion)
- 3 Nature (separation from natural self)
- 4 Other human beings (isolation, loss of community)



Humanity is reduced to a commodity.

6 IDEOLOGY

Ideas, values and beliefs are shaped by the material conditions of society.



"Religion is the 'opium of the people' – ideology that soothes the masses."



7 STATE AND POWER

The state is an instrument of class rule.



- In feudalism – serves the feudal lords.
- In capitalism – serves the bourgeoisie (ruling class).
- In socialism – becomes a tool for the working class (eventually withering away).

"The state is not a neutral body, but a class instrument." – Karl Marx

8 DYNAMICS OF SOCIAL CHANGE

Change comes through contradiction and conflict.



Dialectical process:

Every stage contains its opposite → leads to transformation.

From Quantity to Quality

Gradual changes (quantity) → Revolutionary change (quality)

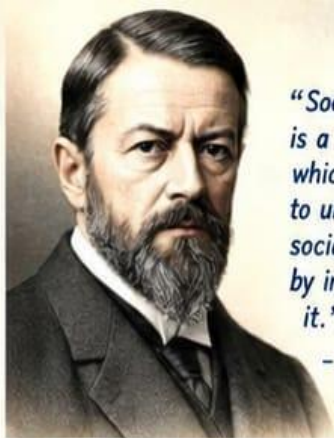

IMPORTANT THEORIES & CONCEPTS

1 SOCIAL ACTION – THE CORE IDEA

- Sociology should understand (*Verstehen*) the meaning behind human actions.
- Social action is action that is meaningful to the actor and oriented towards others.
- Not just external behaviour, but the subjective meaning attached to it.
- Sociology must interpret social action to explain it.



"To understand social action means to grasp the subjective meaning which the actor attaches to it."

– Max Weber

2 TYPES OF SOCIAL ACTION

Weber classified social action into four ideal types:

Traditional Action



Based on habit, custom and tradition.

e.g., following family customs

Affective Action



Based on emotions and feelings.

e.g., anger, love, enthusiasm

Value-Rational Action



Based on belief in a value, ethical or religious ideal.

e.g., working for social justice

Instrumental (Rational) Action



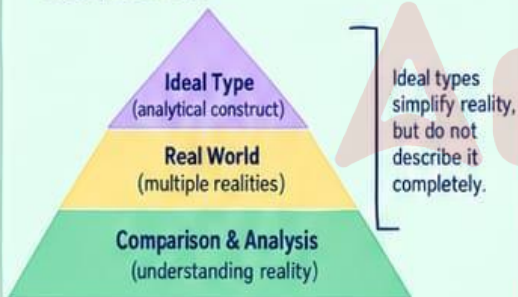
Based on rational calculation of means to achieve an end.

e.g., business decisions

From Traditional → to Rationality (Modern Society)

3 IDEAL TYPES

- A methodological tool used to analyse social reality.
- Not real individuals, but analytical constructs (highlight certain characteristics).
- Help in comparison and understanding of complex social phenomena.



4 BUREAUCRACY – RATIONAL-LEGAL AUTHORITY

- Weber saw bureaucracy as the most efficient form of organization in modern society.
- Based on rational-legal authority.
- Key features:

- Clearly defined rules and regulations
- Hierarchy of authority
- Division of labour
- Written records and documentation
- Impersonality
- Selection based on technical qualification
- Predictability and efficiency

"Bureaucracy is the most rational form of domination."

– Max Weber

5 AUTHORITY – THREE TYPES

Weber identified three pure types of legitimate authority:



Traditional Authority

- Based on tradition and custom.
- e.g., monarchy, hereditary rule.



Charismatic Authority

- Based on extraordinary personal qualities.
- e.g., religious leaders, revolutionaries (like Gandhi).

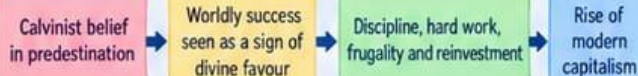


Rational-Legal Authority

- Based on rules, laws and formal procedures.
- e.g., modern state, bureaucracy.

6 PROTESTANT ETHIC AND THE SPIRIT OF CAPITALISM

- Explained the rise of modern capitalism in the West.
- Linked the work ethic of Protestantism (especially Calvinism) with the development of capitalist spirit.
- Key ideas:



"The Protestant ethic provided the cultural roots for the spirit of modern capitalism."

– Max Weber

7 RATIONALIZATION AND MODERNITY

- Modern society is characterized by rationalization – increasing use of reason, calculation and efficiency.
- Leads to the 'disenchantment of the world' (loss of magic, religion and traditional values).
- Results in greater control, but also Rienation and 'iron cage'.



"Rationalization leads to an iron cage."

– Max Weber

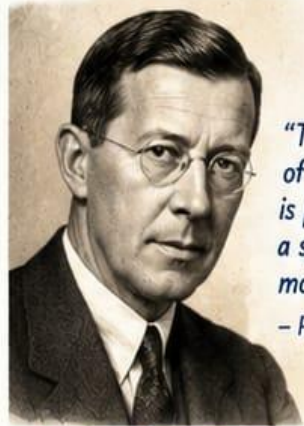

- Approach : Historical, comparative, macro-sociological

IMPORTANT THEORIES & CONCEPTS

1 SOCIAL AND CULTURAL DYNAMICS

- Main work: Social and Cultural Dynamics (1937–41).
- Society and culture are in a constant state of change.
- Change is not linear but cyclical, following certain patterns.
- Cultures are integrated systems of ideas, values, norms and institutions.
- Historical sociology should study long-term cycles of social and cultural change.



Society and culture are dynamic, not static.

"Human society is a ceaseless flow, a process, not a thing."
– Sorokin

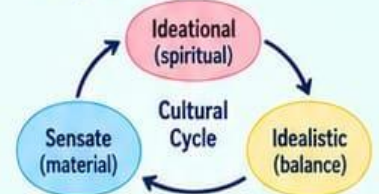
2 TYPES OF CULTURE

Sorokin identified three basic types of culture based on the dominant reality:

Ideational Culture	Idealistic Culture	Sensate Culture
• Reality is spiritual/super-sensory. • Truth through faith, religion and absolute values. • Example: Medieval Europe, Ancient India.	• Balance of spiritual and material. • Synthesis of ideational and sensate elements. • Example: Classical Greece, Renaissance.	• Reality is material and sensory. • Truth through science, reason and senses. • Example: Modern Western society.

3 CULTURAL FLUCTUATION AND CYCLES

- Cultures move in a cyclical pattern, from one type to another.
- No culture is permanent – each eventually declines.
- Excess of one type leads to reaction and shift to another type.
- Explains rise and decline of civilizations through cultural shifts.



Excess → Decline → Reaction → New Cycle

4 SOCIAL MOBILITY

- One of the earliest and systematic theorists of social mobility.
- Developed a multi-dimensional concept of mobility (vertical, horizontal, etc.).
- Mobility occurs through channels like army, church, education, family, etc.
- Open vs. closed societies – depends on degree of mobility.
- Greater mobility leads to social integration and stability.



Mobility is the oxygen of society.

"Society lives and develops through the continuous movement of people and ideas." – Sorokin

5 ALTRUISTIC LOVE

- Proposed Altruistic Love as a key force for social integration and a better society.
- Love is a social and cultural force, not just a personal emotion.
- Altruistic love promotes cooperation, solidarity and universal brotherhood.
- It can transform human nature and reduce conflict.



"Altruistic love is the most powerful creative force in the universe."
– Sorokin

6 SOCIAL AND CULTURAL CRISIS

- Modern society is in a state of moral and spiritual crisis due to the dominance of sensate culture.
- Overemphasis on materialism leads to social disintegration, crime, war and individualism.
- Solution lies in a cultural regeneration through a revival of spiritual and moral values (ideational culture).

7 SOCIOLOGICAL METHODS AND APPROACH

- Advocated comparative and historical method.
- Used interdisciplinary approach – sociology, history, psychology and philosophy.
- Emphasised the importance of empirical study and large-scale comparative analysis.
- Believed in value-neutral and scientific sociology.



Use of historical and comparative analysis.

8 TOWARDS AN INTEGRAL SOCIETY

Envisioned a future integral society based on:

- ✓ Balance of material and spiritual values
- ✓ Altruistic love and cooperation
- ✓ Social justice and moral order
- ✓ Integration of humanity



"The future belongs to an integral civilization based on truth, goodness and love."
– Sorokin
