The negative effects of tobacco smoke are well known, but the good news is that the positive effects Of kicking the habit can't be missed. A smoker can leave the habit forever and can see the amazing results to live a healthier and happier life. As part of a report released by the World Health orgamzation for World No Tobacco Day, the potentially devastating effects of smoking can be successfully reversed.
