The ongoing conflict in Eastern Europe continues to have a bearing on the prices of energy, food and commodities. As observed by the World Trade Organization (WTO), though food and energy prices receded from their post conflict peaks by the fourth quarter last year, "they remained high by historical standards and continued to erode real incomes and import demand" during the mentioned period. The impact of energy prices was strongest during the winter months in Europe as Russia was among the largest suppliers of energy to Europe before it was sanctioned. Europe responded to the loss of gas shipments from Russia by shifting to other suppliers, including the U.S., Oatar, Norway and Algeria. This potentially increased LNG prices elsewhere such as Japan, where the prices doubled between January last year to February this year. In a period of economic slowdown, international trade, both exports and imports, falls sharply as overall demand for goods and services stand reduced. There is an aversion for discretionary spending which particularly weighs on some imports and postponable expenditures. It is in this light that the exports of engineering goods, gems and jewellery, chemicals, and readymade garments and plastics, along with petroleum products contracted or grew at a slower pace in 2023. Similarly, inflation, the uneven rise in prices especially of essentials such as food and energy erodes the purchasing power of an individual. However, it may happen that people in the country may turn to buying imports if they are cheaper than their indigenous products, but this is where the conversion rate may potentially have a bearing to offset the dynamics. Additionally, inflation also affects the flow of capital to a developing country.

Solutions

S1. Ans.(a)

Sol. The correct observation made by the WTO about the recession in prices last year is option (a) - "Food and energy prices were lower near the end of the year than their peak prices during the conflict in Eastern Europe." The passage states, "though food and energy prices receded from their post-conflict peaks by the fourth quarter last year, they remained high by historical standards." This means that the prices of food and energy were lower at the end of the year compared to their peak levels during the conflict, but they were still relatively high historically.





Options (b) is incorrect: This option is incorrect because it inaccurately suggests that prices remained consistently high throughout the year, whereas the passage indicates that while prices receded from their post-conflict peaks, they were still high by historical standards.

Option (c) is incorrect: This option incorrectly suggests that Europe experienced a recession in prices and imports, which contradicts the passage where it mentions that food and energy prices receded from their post-conflict peaks, and there was a shift in energy suppliers. Additionally, it falsely implies that Japan saw an increase in prices, whereas the passage mentions that LNG prices in Japan doubled between January last year to February this year. Also, the statement by option (c) is not an observation made by the WTO, but the author.

Option (d) is incorrect because only option (a) is the correct observation made by the WTO.

Option (e) is incorrect because it includes incorrect statements (b) and (c).

S2. Ans.(c)

Sol. According to the passage, the loss of a source of imports for countries affects the economy globally by causing "increased prices in countries which have lost their original sources of imports." The passage mentions that when Europe lost gas shipments from Russia due to sanctions, they shifted to other suppliers, including the U.S., Qatar, Norway, and Algeria. This shift potentially increased LNG prices elsewhere, such as Japan, where the prices doubled between January last year to February this year. This indicates that the countries that lost their original sources of imports experienced an increase in prices as they had to rely on alternative, possibly more expensive, suppliers.

Option (a) is incorrect because the passage doesn't mention "stagnation in import prices due to conflicting trades observed globally."

Option (b) is incorrect because the passage doesn't suggest a "possible decrease in prices" for the countries importing the commodities.

Option (d) is incorrect because the passage doesn't mention "higher prices of the imported commodities considering higher demand for the commodity worldwide."

Option (e) is incorrect because the correct interpretation of the passage is that the loss of a source of imports can indeed have an impact on the global economy, particularly in terms of price fluctuations and shifts in trade dynamics.

S3. Ans.(c)

Sol. According to the passage, countries can make up for lost sources of imports by "looking to other countries that could act as possible sources of the commodity." When Europe lost gas shipments from Russia, they responded by shifting to other suppliers, including the U.S., Qatar, Norway, and Algeria. This indicates that countries can search for alternative suppliers to replace the lost sources of imports.

Option (a) is incorrect because the passage doesn't mention "increasing the budget for imports for lost imports to attract sellers."

Option (b) is incorrect because the passage doesn't discuss "decreasing reliance on the products with import restrictions" as a way to make up for lost sources of imports.





Option (d) is incorrect because although increasing domestic generation and production might be a response to the loss of imports, the passage doesn't specifically mention it as a way to "make up" for the lack of imports.

Option (e) is incorrect because the passage doesn't suggest "introducing relaxation in import duties to attract more imports" as a response to the loss of sources of imports.

S4. Ans.(b)

Sol. The commodities see lower imports and exports during a period of economic slowdown and inflation due to reasons mentioned in options (III) and (IV):

- **(III) Imports of these commodities are not considered necessary**: The passage states, "There is an aversion for discretionary spending which particularly weighs on some imports and postponable expenditures." During an economic slowdown, people may avoid spending on non-essential items, which can include certain commodities, leading to lower imports and exports.
- **(IV) People spend less on the purchase of these commodities**: The passage suggests that during a period of economic slowdown, there is reduced overall demand for goods and services, and people may spend less on non-essential commodities, leading to lower imports and exports of these items.

Incorrect statements:

- (I) Availability of these commodities for imports increases: This statement does not explain why certain commodities see lower imports and exports during an economic slowdown and inflation. In such periods, demand typically decreases, leading to reduced imports and exports, not an increase in the availability of imported commodities.
- (II) Only non-essential commodities are purchased and imported: During an economic slowdown and inflation, people tend to reduce spending on non-essential or discretionary commodities. As a result, imports of non-essential commodities can decline, which is a valid explanation for lower imports and exports.
- **(V) Government subsidies boost imports of these commodities:** This statement suggests that government subsidies encourage imports of certain commodities, which is not typically an explanation for lower imports and exports during economic slowdown and inflation.

S5. Ans.(d)

Sol. "However, it may happen that people in the country may turn to buying imports if they are cheaper than their indigenous products..."

Both statements (a) and (b) can be considered correct based on the passage.

- **(a)** There is a substantial rise in costs for essentials during a period of inflation: The passage mentions, "inflation, the uneven rise in prices especially of essentials such as food and energy erodes the purchasing power of an individual." This indicates that during inflation, the costs of essential items like food and energy tend to rise substantially, which reduces the purchasing power of consumers.
- **(b) Inflation leads to a decrease in the flow of capital to developing countries**: The flow of capital to developing countries could decrease due to concerns about the stability of their currency and economy. This can be verified by the lines from the second paragraph which state that, "...inflation also affects the flow of capital to a developing country." As the economic effects on the flow of capital cannot be positive, the statement by option (b) is deemed correct.





Option (c) is incorrect. Inflation always leads to a decrease in the availability of essential products:

This statement is incorrect because the passage does not state that inflation always leads to a decrease in the availability of essential products. The passage mentions that inflation can lead to an uneven rise in prices, especially of essentials like food and energy. However, it doesn't suggest that the availability of these essential products always decreases during inflation.

Realising the difference between the author's intent with these statements and the statement by option (c) validates eliminating the possibility of this option as the answer.

Option (e) is incorrect because it combines incorrect statement (c) with correct statement (b).

S6. Ans.(b)

Sol. "Receded" is defined as "to move back or withdraw." Let's analyse each word by its definition and compare with the context.

- (a) advanced: "Advanced" means to move forward or make progress. It is the opposite of "receded" which means to move backward or withdraw.
- (b) diminished: "Diminished" means to decrease or reduce in size, extent, or importance. In the context of the passage, it relates to the decrease of food and energy prices from their peak levels, which is synonymous with "receded."

The word "receded" in the passage means to move back or withdraw. It refers to the decrease or retreat of food and energy prices from their peak levels during the conflict in Eastern Europe. "Diminished" is a suitable synonym for "receded" because it means to decrease or reduce in size, extent, or importance, which aligns with the concept of the prices decreasing from their highest point.

- (c) escalated: "Escalated" means to increase or intensify, usually in a rapid or significant manner. This is the opposite of "receded," which denotes a decrease or reduction.
- (d) restored: "Restored" means to bring back or return something to its original or previous state. It is not synonymous with "receded," as "receded" refers to a backward movement or reduction, while "restored" implies a return to a previous state.
- (e) elevated: "Elevated" means to raised or lift to a higher position or level: For example, an elevated platform or an elevated railway.

Therefore, the correct answer is (b) diminished (synonym for "receded")

S7. Ans.(a)

Sol. "Aversion" is defined as "a strong dislike or disinclination". Let's analyse each word by its definition and compare with the context.

(a) preference: "Preference" means a greater liking or inclination for one option over another. It is the opposite of "aversion," which means a strong dislike or avoidance of something.

The word "aversion" in the passage means a strong dislike or avoidance of something. It relates to the aversion towards discretionary spending and certain imports during a period of economic slowdown. "Preference" is an appropriate antonym for "aversion" because it means a greater liking or inclination for one option over another, indicating a positive and favourable feeling towards something rather than a strong dislike or avoidance.





- (b) amiable: "amiable" is an adjective that describes a person's disposition or character in a positive way.
- (c) loathing: "Loathing" means a feeling of intense dislike or disgust. It is synonymous with "aversion," not an antonym.
- (d) disinclination: "Disinclination" means a lack of enthusiasm or a mild reluctance towards something. It is related to "aversion" as it represents a reluctance or lack of preference for something.
- (e) dislike: "Dislike" means a feeling of not liking or having a negative opinion about something. It is synonymous with "aversion," not an antonym.

Therefore, the correct answer is (a) preference (antonym for "aversion")
