Other options are incorrect because:

Option (a) is incorrect because Lily is not shown as timid or introverted. In fact, she ventures out and explores, which shows curiosity rather than fearfulness.

Option (c) is incorrect because although Lily does wander into the forest, the passage does not describe her as someone known for exploring dangerous territories. That goes beyond what is stated.

Option (d) is incorrect because Lily is not selfish and deceitful by nature. She does make a mistake by drinking the soup, but she immediately feels remorse and apologises sincerely, which shows honesty rather than deceit.

Option (e) is incorrect because Lily is not described as reserved and disciplined, and the passage actually shows that she acted without seeking permission before eating the soup.

Thus, option (b) is the most precise and complete description of Lily's character in the passage. So the correct answer is (b)

Other options are incorrect because:

Option (a) is incorrect because the passage nowhere mentions that the rabbits had urgent work in the forest.

Option (b) is incorrect because there is no statement that they went to fetch more vegetables for the soup.

Option (c) is incorrect because there is no indication that they planned to invite neighbours to share the meal.

Option (e) is incorrect because no startling noise or suspicious incident is mentioned as the reason for their leaving.

Since the reason is directly given in the passage, there is no ambiguity in this question. So the correct answer is (d)

Option (a) "Delighted" is incorrect because the rabbits were not pleased; they were shocked to find their lunch missing.

Option (b) "Frightened" is incorrect because the passage does not primarily show fear. Their first reaction is confusion, not terror.

Option (d) "Enraged" is incorrect because the rabbits are not shown as violently angry.

Option (e) "Suspicious" is incorrect because suspicion means doubt regarding a particular person or thing, whereas "perplexed" here means generally confused and unable to understand the situation.

Hence, the closest meaning of "perplexed" in the given context is "bewildered." So the correct answer is (c)

Q.4 Which of the following is the most appropriate ANTONYM of the word 'REMORSE' as used in the passage?

Option (a) "Sorrow" is incorrect because sorrow is close in meaning to sadness and can overlap with remorse rather than oppose it.

Option (c) "Guilt" is incorrect because guilt is also similar in meaning to remorse, not its antonym.

Option (d) "Regret" is incorrect because regret is nearly synonymous with remorse.

Option (e) "Anxiety" is incorrect because anxiety means worry or nervousness, which is different from both remorse and its opposite.

Therefore, the best antonym available in the options is "indifference." So the correct answer is (b)

Q.5 Which of the following statements is DEFINITELY TRUE based on the passage?

Lily enters the cottage, eats the soup because she is hungry, and then falls asleep. When the rabbits return and investigate, they discover her on the bed. This sequence confirms option (c).

Lines to refer: "Without much deliberation, she sat down at the table and helped herself to the soup, finishing every last drop." and "After searching the cottage carefully, they found Lily sound asleep on the fourth and smallest bed."

Other options are incorrect because:

Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not state that Lily had visited the forest many times before. That detail is not given.

Option (b) is incorrect because the rabbits do forgive Lily. In fact, they respond with kindness and tell her to ask next time.

Option (d) is incorrect because there is no mention anywhere that the rabbits intended to share the soup with a neighbour.

Option (e) is incorrect because the passage does not mention Lily bringing food for the rabbits on a later visit.

Thus, only option (c) is definitely supported by the passage. So the correct answer is (c)

Q.6 Choose the most suitable word to fill the given blank. Read the following passage carefully and answer the questions given below.

Other options are incorrect because:

Option (a) "arranged" is incorrect because food is not normally said to be "arranged" in a pot when the meaning intended is cooking or making it ready.

Option (b) "assembled" is incorrect because although ingredients may be assembled, a pot of soup is not idiomatically said to be assembled in this context.

Option (d) "produced" is grammatically possible in a very broad sense, but it is not the most natural or appropriate word in relation to cooking soup.

Option (e) "constructed" is incorrect because this word is used for buildings, objects, or structures, not for soup.

From the viewpoint of standard English usage, "prepared soup" is the correct collocation. So the correct answer is (c)

Option (c) is incorrect because she did not offer to cook more soup immediately after waking up.

Option (e) is incorrect because she did not claim to have taken only a small portion. In fact, she had finished every last drop.

The passage clearly supports only option (d). So the correct answer is (d)

Option (a) "Haste" is incorrect because haste means speed or urgency. Although Lily did act quickly, it is not the closest meaning of the word "deliberation" itself.

Option (c) "Physical effort" is incorrect because deliberation is a mental process, not bodily exertion.

Option (d) "Sense of fear" is incorrect because the word has nothing to do with fear.

Option (e) "Feeling of excitement" is incorrect because deliberation refers to thinking carefully, not emotional excitement.

Thus, the most accurate synonym in the given context is option (b). So the correct answer is (b)
